The Headlines

New here? Here's what Ignite! does:

We are working to provide young people with endless opportunities to flourish in their creativity, follow their curiosity, and ignite their futures.

How did we do in 2023?

Ignite! had over **6,500** engagements from over 5,200 individual participants and 192 sessions which directly engaged children, young people, and families. Our programmes reached 34 primary schools, 14 secondary schools, 7 special/alternative provision schools and 1 college.

This was our biggest year for programmes like Ada Lovelace Day, Creative Sparks, the Nottingham Festival of Science and Curiosity and Curious Tots, where we reached more participants than ever before.





Our Team

We are proud to actively create early career opportunities within our team. We hosted 11 placement students and interns this year, and provided paid work for 27 freelance creative practitioners. We are grateful for the 100+ volunteers who supported our programmes too, joining up with our growing team which now consists of seven staff members and eight trustees.

Our funders are a vital part of the Ignite! team and in the last year we've teamed up with seven new funders. Over the next year we hope to deepen and widen these relationships to achieve financial sustainability as a charity.



Our work

Outcome 1: Coming together

We want to see the architecture, culture and networks of Nottinghamshire come together to provide for its children and young people.



A variety of Nottingham partners converge on our **Primary Parliament** events to provide schools and pupils with opportunities to learn from and engage with people with a wide range of experiences, knowledge and skills. In 2023 these partners included Green Hustle, Nottingham City Council Transport, Read On Nottingham, Challenge, Lakeside Arts, University of Nottingham, BDP, Skate Nottingham, and Bulwell Forest Garden.



Finishing its second year, our **Curious Tots** nursery programme has now begun providing evidence-based CPD for nursery leads in the <u>Nottingham Schools Trust</u>.

Creative Sparks is supported by NTU psychology students, work experience placements and community volunteers, bringing their own insights and experience to the sessions.

Our **Making Connections** project, exploring identity and mental health through gaming, brought together ten young people, three artists, one writer and two researchers as well as establishing new partnerships with the Outburst Group at Base 51 and Gasleak Mountain.

Our work

Outcome 2: Unlocking creativity

We want to see children and young people reach their potential in any path they desire.



Our Holiday Activities Free Fun and Food programme this year engaged with children and families from right across the city, from Bulwell, Hyson Green, St Ann's and Sneinton, and provided these children with the space, time and freedom to explore nature, galleries, heritage and science centres in their own ways, often for the first time.

Ada Lovelace Day provides an opportunity for 140 Key Stage Three girls to discover the range of futures in biosciences that are open to them. This was also the first time that local primary school pupils have visited BioCity since the pandemic, opening up the possibilities available to children right on their doorstep.

Our pilot **Hidden Figures** project instigated a collaboration between an artist and groups of women, creatively exploring their own understanding and knowledge of health and nutrition and culminating in a shared tasting event as part of the **Festival of Science and Curiosity**.

Creative Sparks in St Ann's and Strelley have been able to experiment with clay, construction, dance, fashion, storytelling, kitemaking; their own ideas influence the activities they take part in and the environment is one where everyone feels free to have a go, play and express themselves.



Our work

Outcome 3: Taking control

We want to see children and young people being heard and able to affect personal and societal change.

Primary Parliament enables children to develop their communication skills to express their ideas in ways that work for them. They overcome their worries about presenting on a stage, or use lego-making, drawing, postermaking, storytelling and poetry to communicate what they think about current social issues.

We worked with special schools for the first time while taking part in the **Real Science in Schools Symposium**, providing a space for these children to recognise themselves as scientists now, not just in the future.

Staff at Crabtree Farm Primary School have said there has been a noticeable impact from **Curious Tots** on their children's confidence in asking questions, being imaginative and expressive, and using materials.
